We argue that in this influential text, Tolkien offers a fictional exploration of sustainability. Combining an application of Geographic Information System techniques with textual analysis and interpreting text and spatial data in conjunction, we show that there is a systematically varying distance between our real world and the physical features of Tolkien's 'Secondary World', as regards climate and vegetation patterns. There is an emphasis on land degeneration, a 'missing forest problem' which prompts a closer look at the role of woods and trees in Tolkien's work. It emerges that the preservation of trees is at the centre of Tolkien's sustainable fictions. For the author, it was a function of fantasy which he wrote against a dystopian and secular modernism...

Harry and his friends embrace these qualities of postmodern childhood and question injustices established by and through the adult wizarding world. The characters' resistance occurs in relation to control of their minds and bodies, the hegemony of wizarding bloodlines, and efforts to frame children as in need of protection. Rowling's novels imagine a culture in which such child agency is possible, where young people become builders of context, awakening to the network of relationships

The word "NOT" in this search limits the results to all the Full Text, Scholarly articles about Rowling, without any reference to Tolkien.

Abstract: This essay discusses the portrayal of enslaved house elves in the Harry Potter book series by British author J. K. 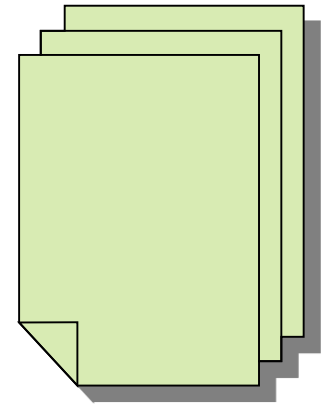
